"VIRTUAL" CORVETTE MECHANIC!

Many of you have heard me talk about Paul Koerner, known as the Corvette Mechanic, who does seminars at Bloomington, NCM and Carlisle. The man is just fun to listen to and watch diagnose an solve Corvette problems on the fly. I always learn so much by spending an hour with him. I have attended several of his paid workshops and others offered while at Bloomington Gold and the NCM events. Not to be stopped by the virus, I recently learned that Paul was doing some virtual seminars using Zoom and I was able to attend one on Sunday evening, April 19th. As you might expect, he session as enlightening and I learned quite a bit. So, here are a few tidbits from this session which was focused on fuel and fuel system issues. First, use top tier rated gas in your Corvette. Top tier gas is a specification and is the most reliable and best fuel that you can get for your car. The difference in deposits and other residue inside your engine over time is very measurable. Locally, Costco is a top tier fuel distributor. You can also find other top tier rated fuels by checking out toptiergas.com



Second, what about storing your car or when it sits idle for a period of time? Do you fill the tank, empty the tank or not worry about it? In the past, quite a few sites have suggested using a fuel stabilizer and filling the tank to eliminate moisture build up. After showing the

typical modern Corvette C5 and up fuel sensor assembly that lives in the tank, Paul jumped on the issue. His recommendation is to leave the tank at the ¼ full or less. The reason is that above that level places the actual fuel level sensor, which is subject to a corrosive build up when sitting idle, submerged in fuel. When the car is in use, this does not matter because the sensor, which has a mechanical component, moves with the change in readings and build up does not occur. When sitting idle, the sensor cannot clean the contacts through movement and the buildup will destroy it over time. You would see this in jerky, inconsistent reading on your gauge or no readings at all. What does the fix cost? Replacement involves removing the tank and because of where it is above wheel shafts in the rear, it is a 15-hour job! Ouch! So, what should we be doing? If storing the car for a long period, leave it only a ¼ full or less. Second, every few months, pour a bottle of **Techron Fuel System Plus** in the tank. This can help with build-up and is one of very few, pour in the tank solutions that actually does a good job for the fuel system. If you do have some issues with the fuel gauge reading pop up, try using Techron Fuel System Plus and see if that help as a first resort.

Finally, a few quick takes for the question and answer round to the session. Got a C7 but really like the 2013 C6 wheel design? You can use them. Same wheel design and they will fit. Got a harmonic balancer wobble problem? This springs up in the C6 space often. Paul's advice – don't replace it with the OEM part. Instead us the Summit Racing Balancer Part # C2501. He has installed quite a few and they have been reliable. Looking for some OEM wheels? Check out Detroit Tire and Wheel.



First, some of the ordering and equipment groupings have been freed up so you can order certain options without committing to the whole a whole group like the Z51 package. Other news concerned two new colors for 21. Red mist metallic tint coat which has been described as "almost a glowing red" and Silver which has been described as a "liquid metal look". There was lot of excitement about the new colors but perhaps the best news was that Chevrolet will NOT be increasing the price of Corvette for 21. Many had predicted that the price would most certainly increase but surprisingly they are holding the line. Many of you may have also seen some of the posts I pushed to our Facebook page regarding the factory reopening process and the status of orders. The factory seems to be back running hard and trucks of new Corvettes are heading to dealers for delivery. The 2021's have been pushed out a bit to allow some of the 2020 orders to be fulfilled but rumor has it that some of the 2020 orders in the system will be filled with 2021 cars. We will see what develops. No official word on the C8 Z06 but the spy shots have been showing up on the web increasingly showing a pretty exotic rear wing and big tires.

One is a steering wheel cover with the Corvette logo made of the same terry towel materials and the other is a cover that lays over your rear deck to protect the paint when loading the rear compartment. They are not overly expensive and easy to clean and use. Give them a look if this fits your needs. I have enjoyed mine.



TALES FROM THE DRIVEWAY AMATEUR MECHANIC!

I am sure that many of you have found yourselves out on the driveway or in the garage confronted with a Corvette or other car repair or enhancement project. Tools and equipment spread out on the concrete, bench or nearby rolling cart while that task that should have only taken an hour or hour and a half max has now extended into half a day with at least one additional trip for parts or a tool you either did not have or that you had, can't find and now own two. Yes, it happens to the best of us. This week it was me working on my wife's truck that would not start and when it was running it made a horrible whine. So, after some diagnosis, I found a bad battery a very old alternator, weak belt tensioner and failing idler pulley. Battery was warrantied out, so I just decided to replace the alternator, tensioner, idler pulley and belt and just get it all out of the way. After replacing the alternator (about 40 minutes) I moved on to the tensioner and pulley which are easy to get to and a single bolt each. No problem. Feeling pretty good about things, I went to put the new belt back on. Well, after 15 minutes of threading and weaving the stubborn belt across all the pulleys and making sure it was just right, I found that it simply would not fit. I checked the pathway, the diagram for the proper route and then just cranked the belt tensioner all the way over and tried my best to muscle it on. No luck. All this went on for an hour and a half while I tried to figure it out and finally decided that I would put the old belt back on and go from there because they had obviously given me the wrong size. Nope! Old belt did not fit either. Called it a day and decided to go at it again the next day after checking the Internet.

An Internet search yielded a number of folks with a very similar experience. The reason has to do with the way car parts are being manufactured these days. Seems that, as you might expect, alternators, pulleys and tensioners to name a few are being manufactured to be more "universal fit" and as a result may not exactly match OEM parts. In my efforts to improve things, the parts I replaced had very slight differences in the circumference of the pulleys. As a result, all three parts together altered the distance needed for the OEM belt to stretch. I also suspect that an AC compressor replacement some years ago also contributed further to this scenario. The solution for me was to go back to the parts store and substitute for a slightly longer belt. New belt in hand and ten minutes later – repair complete and lesson learned.

While I have not had this situation happen to me with Corvette parts, I have encountered poorly made Corvette replacement parts (AC hoses and trim parts for a C3) that were returned because of improper fit or poor performance. Be careful out there. It may not be your mechanical competence but the parts in your hand.



NATIONAL CORVETTE MUSEUM UPDATE!

Virtual Bash! – The NCM converted the Michelin NCM Bash to a virtual event this year. The cost was only \$20, and it was well worth it. If you have been to the Bash before, you know it is like many of the events at the museum with sessions, displays and lots of good conversation. Well, some of that was lost but there were some new benefits. For example, everyone online had a front row seat. In addition, no lines, no waiting and good food and air conditioning at home. The NCM also made the recorded sessions available the week after so if you missed something, you could go back and watch it on your own schedule. From sessions with Paul – The Corvette Mechanic to in depth interviews with GM Engineers on what coming for Corvette, factory updates and Corvette Racing Q&A. This was a thoroughly enjoyable virtual event and the NCM did a great job organizing it.

On Wednesday, June 24 the building was officially

dedicated and named the Chuck, Sharon and Kimberlee Fast Collections Campus. Members of the Museum Board of Directors were on hand for a ribbon cutting ceremony and tour of the facility. Chuck, who is also a member of the Museum and Motorsports Park Boards, was happy to be a part of the project. "Once we accomplished acquiring the building, Sean asked me if we would consider sponsoring the collections building itself. I ran the idea by Sharon, and we decided this would be something our late daughter Kim would like to do or have named after her."
