R8C - ORDERING A NEW CORVETTE AND MUSEUM DELIVERY!

Some have heard the story of my new C8 from planning and ordering to follow through with the full Museum Delivery Experience. In the next two editions, I will cover the story in some detail for those who might be interested. Of course, times have changed a bit since I started my journey. C8 Stingrays and Z06's are sitting in dealer showrooms at MSRP and many with discount offers. Not that long ago, if you wanted a car at MSRP and you wanted to build it the way you wanted; it was an 18 month or so wait. I started my journey during that time. So what follows is the first installment of the story.

Ordering a New C8

As many of you know I have had my C6 Corvette since 2009 when I purchased it from its first owner. The car was a museum delivery car that was configured and ordered from the factory. As a result, the car does not really fit the regular options found in the various 1, 2 or 3LT specifications. In any case I have enjoyed the car over the 16 years I have owned it but as time marched on and the new cars were revealed the lure to jump in on a new C8 grew and it was finally time for me to decide to fish or cut bait.... At the time, we were emerging from COVID and dealer price gouging was a regular topic of the Corvette blogsphere. After talking with several club members who had ordered cars, I elected to jump on the Stingray Chevrolet waitlist since they had a good reputation and they were selling the cars at MSRP. I was provided with monthly updates and a sales representative who worked with me to build off the specifications for the car I wanted. Eighteen months later, I got the call that it was time to submit my build during the April allocation. I finalized it and went over it twice with my sales representative who was knowledgeable about the process and current constraints. As luck would have it, one of the things I wanted to order for my car was the high wing and that was on constraint. The obvious reason was that for 2025, GM was changing the wing offered for the Z51 package to more of a mid-level wing and thus the focus was on producing the new version. Thinking that I could procure the high wing from either a dealer or third-party supplier, I went ahead with my submission. The decision to go was a bit nerve racking in that I had been on a list for 18 months and this was it. I was glad to have gone over the build twice with my contact at Stingray before submission.

Museum Delivery?

I knew about Museum Delivery and always thought that I would do it if I ever ordered a new Corvette. Go big or stay home! Plus, I wanted to celebrate the event after waiting and working towards it. So, what is Museum Delivery about? First, the bad news. It costs \$1500

more and is an option when you configure your Corvette. And even if you are picking your car up at the Museum, you still have to pay the delivery charge that is part of all Corvette purchases. The philosophy here is that everyone pays the same freight charge no matter how near or far you happen to live from the actual plant. The amount is an average so it can easily be worked into the pricing rather than custom charging for each car and breaking up shipping loads on trucks. That's the bad news. The good news is that Museum Delivery is really a nice process. Your car goes from the production line, once cleared for release, right across the street to the NCM Delivery Department. Pre-Delivery Inspection, dealer installed items and a general clean-up is all done by the well-trained staff. Once your delivery date is determined, your car is moved out on the Museum floor the day before, roped off for display and a placard with your name is placed congratulating you on your ownership. The screens around the museum Blvd. where the cars are located will routinely display a congratulatory message with an image of your car acknowledging you as a VIP and mentioning the name of the selling dealer. You receive a number of benefits including a special plaque with your VIN, a custom dash plaque with your name, VIN and NCM logo inside the car just above the wireless phone charger between the seats, a Museum Delivery decal is placed on the driver's side door jamb, a tour of the factory, discounted laps at the Motorsports Park, custom R8C apparel opportunities, the opportunity to purchase a custom photo album of your car actually moving down the production line at each stage, lots of information about the car and its operation, a VIP host is assigned to you for your day and of course a personal orientation and setup of your car while in the Museum before you are driven out with great fanfare, photos and any final Q and A. Overall, this is a great way to celebrate the experience of owning a new Corvette and create some great memories. We loved the experience and would do it all over again.

There were only two regrets that were completely out of the control of the NCM. First, I did want to purchase the custom photo album of my car being built. Photos and explanations of each stage are included. A photographer accompanies the car down the assembly line and documents each phase for the book. Once completed, the book is sent to you shortly after the delivery. Unfortunately, because of restrictions on visitors and tours of the factory at the time my car was built, I could not participate in that program. The photo album would have been quite the keepsake to have. Second, I could not take advantage of my complimentary tour of the plant while there for the same reason. No access to the plant at the time of my delivery. The good news here is that I can take a plant tour at any time up to one year from the date of my delivery so I am looking forward to that opportunity. So, I decided to focus on the things I could do and as a R8C VIP I had some discounts available to me. I booked Lead and Follow laps at the Motorsports Track for Alex and I. And I also booked hot laps for each of us early in the morning of delivery day. We planned to eat at the Stingray Grill, shop the Corvette Store and take advantage of our guided museum tour. (More to come!)

If you have not been, their pool and entertainment area is second to none and offered a wonderful opportunity for a great afternoon.
